

## Basic Skills Evaluation Request form

Individuals may satisfy the Basic Skills Requirements (BSR) through multiple different exams. Please review the <u>BSR Leaflet CL667</u> for all available options. Assembly Bill 130 which was signed by July 9<sup>th</sup>, expands the option to allow an educator to use coursework to meet Basic Skills and may use a combination of coursework and other previously available options to meet the BSR. This new option allows the Commission-approved preparation programs to verify that a candidate or applicant has demonstrated basic skills proficiency by verifying qualifying college-level coursework from a regionally accredited institution of higher education if the following conditions are met:

- The candidate must have earned a grade of "B" or better ("B-" is acceptable) in the qualifying coursework
- The coursework must have been taken at a regionally accredited college or university
- The coursework must provide three semester units (or equivalent quarter units)
- The coursework must have been taken for academic credit (earned units)
- The coursework must be degree applicable (AA degree applicable is acceptable)
- For Reading, applicable coursework must be in the subject of critical thinking, literature, philosophy, reading, rhetoric, or textual analysis
- For Writing, applicable coursework must be the subject of composition, English, rhetoric, written communications, or writing
- For Mathematics, applicable coursework must be in the subject of algebra, geometry, mathematics, quantitative reasoning, or statistics

\*\*\*Please note, qualifying coursework does NOT include professional development courses, continuing education units, in service training or workshops.

San Diego State University undergraduate students could fulfill the BSR requirements for reading, writing and math by completing the required **SDSU General Education** coursework in subareas: **A2 (Writing), A3 (Reading) and B4 (Mathematics**). If you are choosing a coursework option, you must follow the instructions below to complete the BSR Request Form on page 2.

STEP 1: Collect copies of your unofficial or official transcripts to review courses you have completed.

STEP 2: Complete the form on the next page. Refer to the instructions on the webpage (URL)
